Dear friends,

I wonder how many of you reading the magazine were baptised as infants, either in Greenwell Street or elsewhere? I ask because in a recent sermon Gerry reminded us of the obligations laid upon

those who, in baptism, are given the sign of belonging to the Lord. The Child's Catechism asks us the question, 'To what does your baptism bind you?' And replies, 'To be a true follower of Jesus Christ.'

Let's think this through for a moment. Brought by your parent/s for baptism, they were claiming God's sign of belonging for you. You were, by that sign, accepted into the visible community of God's people and, to use another analogy, engaged to be the Lord's. You were placed into a privileged position with parents promising to bring you up in that faith and the church providing both support to them, and the teaching of the good news of the gospel. And all this to what purpose? That you would grow up to be a true follower of Jesus Christ. So, are you? Well how can you tell?

The verses above tell us that remaining in Christ (fruitfulness in faith) is the evidence of belonging to Christ. And that's not just believing in God! The devil does that - no, it is knowing Christ and desiring to serve him daily; it is placing him at the centre of all that you do; it is enjoying worshipping together with his people and learning more and more of his amazing love towards us. Is that you?

The reason I ask is because of what Jesus says next. Not remaining in Christ is turning your back on him - and if you were baptised and engaged to be his and you now have no interest in him - that's exactly what you have done. The consequence - too horrendous to think about! So perhaps this Christmas you will reflect on your baptism and, like shepherds and wise men of old, follow him. How different life will be for now and for ever!

Where are they now? - Shaw Thompson

For Evelyn and myself, Sunday 30th June 1985 was our first Sunday in Greenwell Street and for almost four years we enjoyed the fellowship and encouragement of a warm and gracious congregation. We left for Dromara on Sunday 2nd February 1989. We have such fond memories of those days, we often talk and share those experiences, and many names and friendly faces come to mind. Sarah was born on 30th March 1986 and Naomi on 26th July 1988 and both girls were baptised in Greenwell Street. Sarah has some memory of her short time there but, of course, Naomi has not.

These days Evelyn and I continue to minister in First Dromara and have been much encouraged over the years. Some of you may recall the start we had. Three days in we discovered a dry rot infestation in the manse which meant that even before my installation we were looking at a building project (for an aged congregation, with substantial debt). God used those early days in a wonderful way. I remember the support of Dr and Mrs Sterritt and quite a number of Greenwell Street friends coming up to help us move house - three times in 20 days (and to take care of two very little girls while they did so)!

God has done wonderful things for us in Dromara. We have seen many folk saved and added to His church. We now have over 200 families and 685 members, (despite the fact that I have just officiated at my 182nd funeral in Dromara. We had 135 families when we arrived and probably about 50 original families

remain as so many of the deaths were the end of a family line. Added to this we are the "country congregation", located two miles out of the village in the country.

Since coming to First Dromara we have built a new Manse, built a new suite of Halls (Dr Sterritt fulfilled Moderators role at the opening) including Youth lounge with Coffee Bar and Class rooms for all ages. Added to this we have renovated our

meeting house, installing a complete new ceiling and lighting, new floor new audio visual powerpoint system and complete new heating system. Two new organs. All of this was completed in faith, with a total spend of almost one million pounds. God has been good to us!

More importantly we have seen many people saved. Those young men and women who have come to faith



and taken on leadership roles have been such a blessing. We are now long enough here to see many of the children of those young couples taking a full role. Twenty of those teenagers who were born and grew up under our ministry were on various outreach events this year. We seek to fulfil our missional vision at home and overseas. A team from First Dromara renovated the Dublin Road premises for Belfast City Mission, and we have been in the centre of building a school in Uganda. Thank God he has provided people and resources to do all these things in His name.

Family life is quite different now, Evelyn and I are on our own in the manse. Both our girls came to Saving Faith early in life for which we will be eternally grateful. Both attended Methodist College Belfast. Sarah went on to Brasenose College Oxford and graduated in jurispru-

dence (law) in 2007. She now lives in London and works as a Financial regulatory Lawyer at linklaters, a magic circle firm in the City. Naomi graduated in Medicine from Queens University in Belfast in 2012, she is now working as a Doctor in Craigavon Hospital, specialising in geriatrics. Going forward in God's will there is much to do in Dromara. We have a vision of reaching the

lost, growing disciples, building His church. There is a time for everything as we learn in Ecclesiastes 3; and just as Esther was placed where she was "for such a time as this", so we believe that God has placed us where He wants us to be. We are in His will and are content to do His bidding.

Teach us to Pray - Praise

Who of us does not struggle with prayer? The truth is probably more of us than we would dare to admit to! Matthew Henry (1662-1714) known throughout the church for his Commentary on the Bible, stopped his work on it to do another work that he considered even more important - a method of prayer. Over the next few magazines, we will draw on some of this work and thereby, hopefully, encourage a greater spirit of prayer among us.

Approach God with a heart full of praise for the glories of his Person and Work.

Turn your attention totally to this special moment of drawing near to Almighty God. Gather in all your wandering thoughts. Present yourself to him as a living sacrifice with a lively faith. Then bind the sacrifice of

your heart and mind with cords to the horns of the altar by the very words of Scripture (Rom.12:1; Psa. 118:27).

Bring before your mind some of the glorious aspects of this great God

1. He is an eternal God who has no beginning of days, end of life, or change caused by the passing of time.

You are the King eternal, immortal, invisible. Before the mountains were brought forth or you had formed the earth and the world, from everlasting to everlasting you are God.

You are the same yesterday today and forever. At the beginning of time you laid the foundation of the earth, and the heavens are the work of your hands. They shall perish, but you endure. All of them shall age as though they were articles of clothing. You shall treat them as a change of garments, and they shall be discarded. But you are the same, and your years shall never end (1 Tim. 1:17; Psa. 90:2; Heb. 13:8; Psa. 102:25-27).

You are God. You never change, and for that reason alone we are not consumed. Are you not from eternity O Lord our God, our holy One? You are the everlasting God, the Lord and Creator of the farthest reaches of the earth. You never faint with exhaustion. You never grow

weary. There is no way that your understanding can ever be comprehended (Mal. 3:6; Hab. 1:12; Is. 40:28).

2. He is present in all places and at all times with all his glory.

You are a God at hand, never a far-away God. None can hide himself in some secret place where you cannot see him, for you fill heaven and earth. You are not far from any one of us. We will never escape your presence or elude your Spirit. If we ascend to heaven, you are there. If we make our bed in the earth's depths - Look there you are! If we fly away on the outstretched wings of the morning's rays or sail to the uttermost parts of the sea's expanse, even there your hand shall lead us and your right hand shall sustain us. We can never outrun you (Jer.23:23,24; Acts 17:27; Psa.139:7-10).

3. He knows all persons and things perfectly, and sees clearly their most hidden secrets.


All things are naked and exposed before the eyes of the One with whom we have to do. Even the secret thoughts and intents of every human heart are fully known by you. Your eyes are in every place scrutinizing the evil and the good. They run back and forth throughout the earth that you may show yourself strong in support of those whose hearts are right with you (Heb. 4:12, 13; Prov. 15:3: 2 Chron. 16:9).

You search the heart and examine the mind, so that you may give to every man a reward according to his ways, and fruit according to his doings. You have searched us out and known us. 

Mary Berry's Yule Log

Ingredients

- 4 large eggs
- 100 g caster sugar
- 65 g self-raising flour
- 40 g cocoa powder


For the chocolate icing and topping:

- 275 g dark chocolate, broken into small pieces
- 450 ml double cream
- 4 tbsp apricot jam
- icing sugar, for dusting
- holly and red berries, to garnish

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200°C/gas 6. Grease and line a 33 x 23cm Swiss roll tin with baking parchment, securing the corner with metal paperclips.
- 2. For the sponge, place the eggs and sugar together in a large bowl. Using an electric hand whisk, beat the mixture until it is pale, light and frothy.
- 3. Sieve the flour and cocoa powder into the bowl and carefully fold in to the egg mixture, using a metal spoon and taking care not to beat any of the air out of the mixture.
- 4. Pour in to the lined tin and spread out into the corners. Bake in the middle of the oven for about 8-10 minutes until pale golden and the sides are shrinking away from the edge of the tin.
- 5. Place a piece of baking parchment bigger than the

Swiss roll on the work surface. Invert the cake on



- 6. Trim the edges of the cake with a sharp knife and make a score mark 2.5cm in along the longer edge. Roll up (from the longer edge) using the paper, rolling it up with the paper inside. Set aside to cool.
- 7. While the cake is cooling, make the icing. Melt the chocolate and 300ml of the cream in a bowl over a pan of simmering water. Refrigerate until cool and thickened. Whip the remaining cream.
- 8. Uncurl the cold Swiss roll and remove the paper. Spread a third of the icing over the surface then spread the whipped cream on top, and re-roll tightly. Cut a quarter of the cake off from one end, on the diagonal. Transfer the large piece of cake to a serving plate and angle the cut end to the side of the large cake to make a branch. Cover the surface of the cake with the melted apricot jam.
- 9. Put the remaining chocolate icing into a piping bag fitted with a star nozzle. Pipe long thick lines along the cake, covering the cake completely so it looks like the bark of a tree. Cover each end with icing or, if you wish to see the cream, leave un-iced.
- 10. Dust with icing sugar and garnish with fresh holly and red berries.

And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!" Luke 2:10-14

Should Christians celebrate Christmas?

I sympathize with those who want to be rigorously and distinctly Christian, who want to be disentangled from the world and any pagan roots that might lie beneath our celebration of Christmas, but I don't go that route on this matter because I think there comes a point where the roots are so far gone that the present meaning doesn't carry the pagan connotation anymore. I'm more concerned about a new paganism that gets layered on top of Christian holidays.

Here's the example I use: All language has roots somewhere. Most of our days of the week—if not all—grew out of pagan names too. So should we stop using the word "Sunday" because it may have related to the worship of the sun once upon a time? In modern English "Sunday" doesn't carry that connotation, and that's the very nature of language. In a sense, holidays are like chronological language.

Christmas now means that we mark, in Christian ways, the birth of Jesus Christ. I think the birth, death and resurrection of Christ are the most important events in human history. Not to mark them in some way, by way of special celebration, would be folly it seems to me.

I remember I lived next door to somebody back in seminary who didn't celebrate birthdays for their kid. The idea was, partly, that all days were special for their kid. But if all days are special then it probably means that there are no special days. Yet some things are so good and precious - like anniversaries, birthdays, and even deaths - that they are worthy of being marked. How much more the birth and death of Jesus Christ!

It's really worth the risk, even if the date of December 25 was chosen because of its proximity to some kind of pagan festival. Let's just take it, sanctify it, and make the most of it, because Christ is worthy of being celebrated in his birth.

There is no point in choosing any other date. It won't work.
